
Developmental Stages of Writing

These stages are typical representations of writing in pre-school and Foundation.

Pre-Literate		
Stage Description	Sample	
Scribble Stage- starting point any place on page, resembles drawing large circular strokes and random marks that do not resemble print or communicate a message	On Do / long	
Symbolic Stage- starting point any place on page, pictures or random strokes/marks with an intended message	3 de "I am happy."	
Directional Scribble- scribble left to right direction, linear, intended as writing that communicates a meaningful message/idea	"I am playing."	
Symbolic/Mock Letters- letter-like formations, may resemble letters but it isn't intentional, interspersed w/ numbers, spacing rarely present	TIGEOW	

Emergent		
Strings of Letters- long strings of various letters in random order, may go left to right, uses letter sequence perhaps from name, usually uses capital letters, may write same letters in many ways	TAHOZFTX	
Groups of letters-groupings of letters with spaces in between to resemble words	WI SOL CY	
Labeling pictures- matching beginning sounds with the letter to label a picture	100 D 28E	
Environmental Print- copies letters/words from environmental/classroom print, reversals common, uses a variety of resources to facilitate writing	CLOCK MUM	

Transitional,		
Letter/Word Representation-uses first letter sound of word to represent entire word, uses letter sound relationships	I (I went home.)	
First/Last Letter Representation- word represented by first and last letter sound	Cat)	
Medial Letter Sounds- words spelled phonetically using BME sounds, attempts medial vowels, uses some known words, more conventionally spelled words, one letter may represent one syllable, attempts to use word spacing, writing is readable	MI CAT IS B N (My cat is brown.)

How can you help your child?

Read, read, read!

Foster a love of reading and model it as an enjoyable and useful skill.

Read with expression

Story time can be very enjoyable and it encourages your child to read with expression, rather than a monotone, when reading.




Read and repeat

Re-reading favourite stories encourages your child to join in and develop fluency.

Play word and sound games

Sound games such as 'I Spy' help to develop sound awareness. It's useful to focus on the sound rather than letter.



Children develop at their own pace, and your little one may not be interested in reading or playing words games right now. That's ok!





Knowledge of the Number Naming System


Initially, children learn the number names as an orally learnt sequence, sometimes referred to as rote counting



Counting books reinforce this sequence and begin to associate number names with collections (cardinality principle)







Counting

To count effectively, children not only need to know the number naming sequence, they need to recognise that:

- counting objects and words need to be in one-to-one correspondence;
- "three" means a collection of three no matter what it looks like;
- the last number counted tells 'how many'.

Volunteering



Parents / Grandparents and other family members are encouraged to volunteer.

Volunteers require a current Working with Childrens Check. Volunteers undergo a selection and induction process.

Volunteering can also include:

- Member of School Council
- Member of a Sub-Committee
- Assisting with small group class activities in English and Chinese
- Assisting in making / organising classroom resources
- Helping out in the garden / feeding chooks
- Maintenance of library

Voluntary Financial Contributions



Public education is free and all financial contributions are voluntary. Each year, the school asks for voluntary contributions to cover the costs of:

- Ongoing supply of stationery and workbooks;
- Specialist subject materials;
- ICT Equipment / Apps / Online Subscriptions;
- Wellbeing (including first aid, garden etc.)

For 2023, the recommended Curriculum Contributions amount is \$360 and Other Contributions is \$140.

There is also a "Make a Difference" fund for families in need and two tax-deductible funds/entities (APS Library and School Building Fund).
